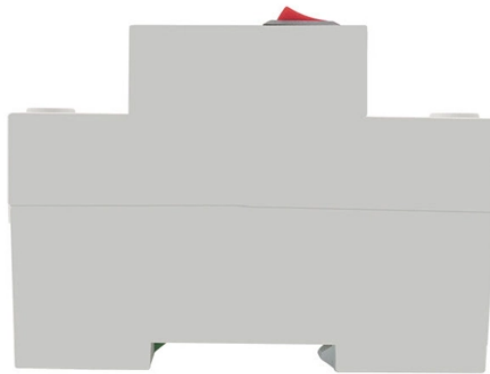

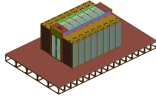

The goal is to fuse the two fibers together in such a way that light passing through the fibers is not scattered or reflected back by the splice, and so that the splice ...



After the two pigtails are pulled out, the cold joint is used to realize the docking of the two pigtails. It is easier and faster to operate, saving time than welding with a fusion splicer.



From start to finish, the fusion-splicing process has four main steps: 1.) preparing the cable and fiber ends, 2.) fusing the fiber ends together, 3.) adding-splice protection or re-coating the ...

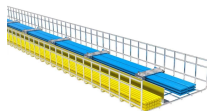
